Leratong

Leratong helps the community

So typical of this wonderful country of ours with its many contradictions, we should not forget that while the 2010 flags flew and the vuvuzelas vibrated, there were others in Alex who were unable to feel the joy.

Leratong pre-school was closed for the month (as were all the schools in SA), but that didn't mean Peggy had a break. It was a time of hard work and tragedy when 42 shacks caught fire, 4 people died, and many were injured and badly burnt. The 70 homeless slept on the floor of the Leratong classrooms, and food was brought in to help – 'bread for Africa', chicken and juice. A desperate and sad time.

It seems as if a young man killed his girlfriend out of jealousy and set her shack alight. With the wild fire spreading through the flimsy wooden and corrugated iron homes, President Zuma was giving his "Football for Hope" speech nearby in Alex.

Visiting with Peggy

The truth and reality of what it's like to live in Alex was revealed during a visit to 3 desperate families... In a tiny room a little family struggles to cope – a massive tree with huge gnarled roots is collapsing their home exposing it to the elements. Inside, Makhosi (23) tries to look after her 5 nieces & nephew (ranging in age down to 5). Her mother, grandmother and 6 sisters all died last year, she is unemployed, and without food. How they manage to be so cheerful and full of smiles, I do not know. Gumboots is helping with blankets, food and hopefully assistance in getting government grants.

The next family visited was a gogo-headed household. Her daughters having all died, she is left with 31 grandchildren and great-grandchildren to support – all in one room! One of these is a 3-year-old on permanent oxygen for a heart condition. When the electricity is cut off, they have to rush this tiny girl plus oxygen cylinder to the other side of Alex where there is power until it is restored in their home. Nobody is employed and they survive on small grants. Peggy is hoping that the Housing Department will help this family as well as Makhosi's, but bureaucracy and lack of resources remain a problem.

In the next home we met another mentally ill grandmother who lives with her 15-year-old grandson, Sibosiso. He goes to school without shoes or uniform, and Peggy is afraid that he will inevitably get caught up in the crime and drugs that abound.

There can, and must, be a positive end to these stories. With the ongoing help of our donors, we can make this happen.
