
Elizabeth became terminally ill, but thanks to the help from Ingrid, she is now healthy – she is taking her ARVs, she gets bags of food and fresh vegetables, the children play at the Centre and Elizabeth is able to talk to and share her problems with the other gogos there.

Ingrid says: *"We are humbled by the generosity of those who are helping us because they are saving the life of this grandmother and her children. If it was not for the people who are donating to our organisation, it would be very difficult for all of us. So really we are honoured."*

PHETOHO EDUCATION

ST MARY'S OUTREACH

St Mary's School, Johannesburg, has for the last 25 years recruited children from Alex schools as part of an Outreach Programme. Each year 250 children from Grades 9 to 12 spend Saturday morning at the school. Teachers and volunteers give up their time to coach the children in all subjects, but particularly Maths, Science and Accountancy. When the school term ends, they continue with holiday programmes and motivational talks by past students.

From 2015 Gumboots is on board with this worthwhile project. We have funding to send a few of our children from the different projects to join the programme. We have just recruited five young girls who have satisfied the criteria: a supportive environment at home; food and electricity for studying; a strong commitment; and a high educational standard, especially in Maths. We are very grateful to the Big Give UK Challenge that has made it possible to sponsor these students.

LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

The Young Entrepreneur & Leadership Initiative is continuing under the mentorship of three young women from Deloitte. One of the girls who attends the Saturday sessions in the Learning Centre at Ratang Bana is Angel Tshongwe. She is also one of the group of five who will be attending the St Mary's School Outreach Programme next year.

On hearing that she was accepted, Angel said: *"This makes me happy and sad. I am happy to be joining and learning a lot – and I won't let you down. But I am sad as I will have to leave the Leadership Group as they also meet on a Saturday and I love this programme and its teachers."*

THE CHALLENGE OF EDUCATION

For some children in Alex it is hard to cope with the demands of school and the lack of family support. Itumeleng Selulu is a bright and lively 8 year old with better prospects having been selected to go the United Church School at the beginning of last year. However, his home situation is a continual challenge. A red flag was raised a few months ago with his falling marks and behaviour, and Beauty, the Sigiya Sonke "parent" looked into it. Itumeleng has now had a comprehensive educational and psychological assessment and it appears as if he needs to go to a remedial school. We are following up on this situation.

The other four Phetoho children at the school are all doing well. Two of them are having extra lessons and are benefitting from that ... as well as the interest and care they get from Jack, who is not only their patient dance teacher, but also their taxi driver.

Zimvo Njaju is one of the students that Gumboots supports with school fees. He has a difficult time at home, living in a small shack with his two siblings and finds it hard to study. We are waiting to see what his report indicates to see what help we can give. Zimvo is a huge help to Jack and is taking on the responsible role of coaching the 6-12 year old kids. *"I am very much happy to help Jack and gain experience. We are rehearsing for the end-of-year performance at the moment."*



SCHOOL HOLIDAY CAMP

Dancing builds health and camaraderie.

Jack decided to use the holiday time to help coach the new kids in the group – as well as to keep them all off the streets and away from the temptation of alcohol and drugs. So he set aside two weeks where the children came from 10 – 3pm to the Warehouse. The 9 to 11-year-old dancers were coached by himself, his daughter Deli and Zimvo. Not only did they dance, but they had fun using the fire-hose to

clean out the winter dusty warehouse.

The kids loved their "holiday camp", the finale of which was a performance at the Alex Old Age Home on Mandela Day. They did their 67 minutes with gusto – and one of the old granny's asked where they were from... *"From Alex?? I am so happy to see that young children are dancing again like we used to when we were young."*



NEWSLINKS ABROAD

USA KIDLINKS AND THE CAL POLY STUDENTS

In August Kidlinks, our American partner, was once more responsible for bringing the Cal Poly students of landscape architecture to visit Ratang Bana. They have been coming on an annual basis and helping to build and maintain the food garden, as well as design and build an amazing playground there. This year they spent time fixing and repairing the playground equipment.

It has been recently announced that these students won the National Students Award of Excellence for this project. This is the highest award offered to students of Landscape Architecture in the USA. Kidlinks has been mentioned as a project partner and this will bring national awareness to their work. They were featured in *Landscape Architecture* magazine, and in addition, one of the pieces will be constructed and exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. This is a huge honour for the students – congratulations to all.
